



## Special Education Curriculum Worksheet (2024 – 2025) Bachelor of Arts

This worksheet outlines the required courses for this major. Students are expected to be familiar with general education and major-specific requirements for their intended major as outlined in the Clemson Undergraduate Catalog. Additionally, students must satisfy any Tri-County prerequisites for the courses below. To complete Bridge program requirements, students must earn 30 credits at Tri-County and a 2.5 GPA during their Bridge year (fall, spring, and optional summer, if needed). **A 2.75 GPA is required for Bridging directly into an Education major at Clemson.** Students should consult the backside of this worksheet, the Undergraduate Catalog, and the Bridge Academic Guide for Clemson course equivalencies and alternative courses if students wish to enroll in other courses or if any of the following requirements have been met through dual enrollment or AP/IB credit. Advising worksheets are supplemental planning aids and are for informational purposes only.

## College of Education Entry Major Information

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Entry into education majors requires students to maintain a 2.75 GPA to cross the Bridge into the major. Students should also complete Praxis Core requirements for education (by taking or waiving Praxis Core - details provided to Bridge in a separate form).

**Bridge students must meet the following requirements by the end of their Bridge year to enter directly into the program and advance to the professional-level education coursework at Clemson:**

1. Have a cumulative 2.75 GPA or higher
2. Satisfy the Praxis Core Requirement in one of the following ways:
  - a. Have an SAT score of 1100+, or
  - b. Have an ACT score of 22+, or
  - c. Take and pass the Praxis Core ([www.ets.org/praxis](http://www.ets.org/praxis)).
3. Complete the Bridge program requirements (earning at least 30 credit hours and 2.75 GPA)
4. Complete the Math course for your Education major **AND**
5. Complete two semesters of a modern language through the 102-course level or meet with a College of Education Academic Advisor to discuss your plan for completing modern languages at Clemson if your desired language is not offered at TCTC.

Students who do not have an SAT score of 1100+ or an ACT score of 22+, must **TAKE and PASS** the Praxis I Core Academic Skills exam and meet the other criteria listed above.

### **What if a student does not meet entry requirements?**

If a Bridge student does not complete all the specific program requirements, they may need additional semesters of undergraduate coursework or summer school coursework to complete the required math, modern language, and other program-specific requirements.

Students who do not meet the minimum 2.75 GPA requirement will not be considered for direct admission into a College of Education program. These students may cross the Bridge to Clemson in an alternate major and consider the change-of-major application process once at Clemson. Taking additional semesters of coursework to complete program requirements will result in a later graduation plan for some students.
